




Old Shawnee Days Parade — June 3rd, 2023

GKCTCC Meeting Minutes April 2, 2023 (2 PM) National Agricultural Hall of Fame

Meeting was opened with the flag salute at 2:00 pm. There were no new guests/members.

President Read sought approval of the February 2023 meeting minutes. Lori Meyer moved, Bob Antes seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Herman Sachse gave the financial report. The general account began with a balance of \$10087.71 and after expenditures/deposits, ended with \$10,132.48. The scholarship fund account began with a balance of \$3584.50 and ended at \$3945.65. Bryce York moved to accept the financial account. Lloyd Mesmer seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Barnyard Babies will be held April 22, with a petting zoo, train and a tractor show. It was recommended that batteries be disconnected. It runs 10-4, please be in place prior to the start time. It is a major fundraiser for the Ag Hall.

The tractor cruise was discussed. Meeting at Basehor. Drivers meeting is at 8:30. We plan to start at 9 am. Lunch from Hilltop at Jarbalo. Please turn in registrations so we can give a number to the caterer.

The June meeting will be held June 4th at the Sachse farm in Leavenworth. Sachse's will provide a taco salad for lunch at 1 pm, with meeting to follow, and a tour of the tractors. A white elephant was the logo for what products sold by John Deere's St. Louis sales branch? (See last page for answer!)



Who are Kim and Herman Sachse?

Herman Sachse was born and raised in Leavenworth County Kansas in a little community called Lowemont, 64 years ago. He attended Immaculata High School where he met Kim. He then attended Northeast Kansas Technical School where he completed the Autobody Repair Program. He worked in autobody repair for a few years, before joining State Farm as a collision repair estimator. He married Kim in April 1980. After living in town for three years, they built their home at Ridgewood Farm, where his mother spent her childhood. In July 2010, they were awarded the Century Farm award for having over 100 years of family farm ownership. They are the proud parents of 2 children, and 3 grandchildren.

How did you get interested in collecting John Deere tractors? I grew up on a farm where my dad was mostly farming with John Deere tractors. His first John Deere was a 1929 John Deere GP. He later sold that and got a 1934 John Deere A with an open fan shaft, on steel, which was later converted to round spoke with rubber tires. The first tractor I

steered (at a very young age) with my dad on the seat was a John Deere 520 LP, that dad purchased brand new. It was the only new tractor he ever bought and I still have that in my collection. The first tractor I was allowed to drive by myself was a Case SC, with a right hand hand-clutch, like the John Deeres. We later added a 620 LP, a 730 LP and then a 4010 LP.



How many tractors do you have in your collection? Don't know the exact number but it's over 100. What's your favorite tractor that you've collected? I have too many favorites to choose just one, a few of them include 44a, 520, 620, 730, 3020, and 4020 LP. What's the rarest tractor you have? 720 LP standard. How did you find over 100 tractors to collect? It's easy, I ask questions and my wife enables me by introducing me to Facebook marketplace and pointing out tractors that she thought I might be interested in. (Loud groan from Kim.) Do you have a pristine showroom? No. Most are just as they were purchased and have not been restored. It is a work in progress. I collect tractors, implements, cars, trucks, bicycles, and motorcycles. So I have a variety of things to look at in a variety of states of repair. My smallest tractor is a John Deere H and my largest tractor is a 4430.





What's your favorite tractor hunting story? An honorable mention for tractor hunting was finding a John Deere model H within 10 miles of Kenny Read's property that he didn't know about. How long have you been collecting tractors? I've had a tractor since at least 1977. The first tractor I bought was an H Farmall. The first John Deere I bought was a model H. The closest tractor to my dad's 34A is my 1936A on the rear steel. All original.

Do you have any memorable incidents? I think I was in grade school at the time. I was raking hay with the 520 in a waterway, (which I had to rake fast to turn over, due to how heavy the hay was). Because it had numerous ruts from previous mowings, I reached for the throttle to slow down because I saw a rut ahead, but the rear tractor tire hit an unforeseen rut. I was bounced out of the seat to the right, holding the steering wheel, with my left hand. Could not hold on with my single hand and the tractor tire pulled me off of the tractor and flung me to the right of the tractor. The tractor tire missed me, but the hay rake was headed for me so I rolled on the ground numerous times to get out of the way. The tractor was turning to the right, and made a complete circle on its own. I then jumped up and stepped on the step and got back into the seat. A little rattled, but not even bruised. Even though my dad was baling somewhat behind me with the big round baler, he stopped me the next round. He saw where I made a complete circle, and assumed the rake got balled up with excessive hay. I simply agreed and went on. We never discussed that incident. I don't know if he witnessed it or not. I'm sure my guardian angel was with me that day!



Kim worked in the Federal Government, at Fort Leavenworth, US Penitentiary and the Department of Veteran's Affairs. After she retired, she did part-time teaching for the Graduate School USA and is helping with the Rural Water District. When asked at a Gathering of the Green Auction, which of Herman's 100+ tractors was hers, she said well all of them of course. The whole room burst out laughing and the auctioneer was at a loss for words.

I was a charter member of the Greater Kansas City Two Cylinder Club with number 20. Kim & Herman encourage everyone to come out for some Taco Salad, and a great meeting of friends!

ANSWER TO TRIVIA (pg 5): Buggies and carriages. About 1891, the Mansur & Tebbetts Carriage Co. was formed to build buggies, carriages, sleighs and other passenger vehicles, which were sold through the St. Louis branch, along with Moline wagons. When Mansur died in 1898, Deere & Co. bought the St. Louis branch house outright, along with the Mansur & Tebbetts Carriage Co. The vehicle business was good and, in 1903, Mansur & Tebbetts Carriage Co. built a new 150,000-square-foot factory with a capacity of 30,000 vehicles per year. Mansur & Tebbetts used a white elephant as their official logo and bragged in their ads that they were the "Sole Makers (of) White Elephant Vehicles."
